Important date for your diary

Please **VOTE** and **HAVE YOUR SAY** on Thursday 19th July 2018

The Parish Council initiated a Neighbourhood Plan in November 2013, so it has been a long journey to now. While neighbourhood planning sprung out of the Localism Act of 2011 it was slow in implementation as Planners and Councils evolved the rules guiding them and as such there was a considerable amount of evolution as guidelines became established and precedents set.

Nevertheless, we are shortly to arrive at the end of the journey and be afforded the opportunity of our Referendum at last. While the Plan itself has evolved through various constraints, assessments, consultations and examinations, two themes have remained consistent throughout; we have achieved protection for the countryside around us so that Slinfold can retain its village feel; and the number of houses we have had to accept has remained pretty constant in a range of 60-100 over the life of the Plan.

There has, by necessity, been a great deal of compromise to achieve an acceptable and sustainable solution and, as in politics in general, it has not been possible to please all the people all the time. However, the overall result we believe, contains sufficient benefits for all.

What has also changed since we started the plan has been the relentless pressure from Government for more housing in the South East. Irrespective of your political views, this pressure is driven by the successful regional economy and of course people want to live where the opportunities are. However, in order to cope with this pressure sensitively and, in the face of the forthcoming changes to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) villages such as ours need to protect what they have even more than before.

In light of the most recent consultation, 70 responses were received and Horsham has now issued its Decision Statement and their conclusions follow closely the representation of the Parish Council.

The final sites for housing will be: East of Hayes Lane, West of Spring Lane, Crosby Farm (north of the cricket pitch) and Cobblers. Site numbers have been removed, which a lot of people objected to, but the site areas have been reduced in two instances which should help keep the numbers controlled. The Hayes Lane site has been made deeper towards the footpath but shorter by about 50m so it will not go so far up Hayes Lane. At Spring Lane, a significantly larger buffer area has

reduced the length of the site along Spring Lane by around 90m.

The Scout Hut has its current location reinforced in the Plan and so when plans come forward for the redevelopment at Cobblers, unless the Scouts have moved elsewhere, there will be provision for them.

The plans for end of West Way caused a lot of debate after the Examiner recommended its removal as a site from the Plan. The initial response from Horsham was to maintain the numbers by transferring the 18 homes lost at West Way to the Hayes Lane site. However, the Parish Council made the argument with HDC on an incoming application at Wellwyn, Hayes Lane for 13 new homes which whilst technically a 'Windfall' site was a significant contribution to the overall numbers. Slinfold Parish Council was consequently, able to support the removal of the West Way site.

And so, the end is in sight for the Slinfold Parish Neighbourhood Plan. Use the opportunity to vote in favour, or against, the Plan on Thursday 19th July and enable us to grow this parish in a controlled and sustainable way, keeping its wonderful character and giving others a chance to make it their home as we have all been so fortunate to do so.

COUNCIL MATTERS

General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR)

When you contact us

The information you provide (personal information such as name, address, email address, phone number, organisation) will be processed and stored to enable us to contact you and respond to your correspondence, provide information and/or access our facilities and services. Your personal information will be not shared with or provided to any other third party except as necessary to deal with the matters you have raised, or with your consent.

The Council's Right to Process Information

General Data Protection Regulations Article 6 (1) (e) - Processing is necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in the Council.

Information Security

Slinfold Parish Council has a duty to ensure the security of personal data. We make sure that your information is protected from unauthorised access, loss, manipulation, falsification, destruction or unauthorised disclosure. This is done through appropriate technical measures and appropriate policies. Copies of these policies can be requested. We will only keep your data for the purpose it was collected for and only for as long as is necessary. After which it will be deleted. You may request the deletion of your data held by Slinfold Parish Council at any time.

Children

We will not process any data relating to a child under the age of 13 without the express consent of the parent or guardian of the child concerned.

Access to Information

You have the right to request access to the information we have on you. You can do this by contacting the Parish Clerk. We may ask you to confirm your identity.

Information Correction

If you believe that the information we have about you is incorrect, you may contact us so that we can update it and keep your data accurate. Please contact the Parish Clerk to request this.

Information Deletion

If you wish Slinfold Parish Council to delete the information about you please contact the Parish Clerk to request this. Please be aware that the Council might then be unable to deal with the matters you have raised.

Right to Object

If you believe that your data is not being processed for the purpose it has been collected for, you may object. Please contact the Parish Clerk to object.

Rights Related to Automated Decision Making and Profiling

Slinfold Parish Council does not use any form of automated decision making or the profiling of individual personal data.

Complaints

If you have a complaint regarding the way your personal data has been processed you may make a complaint to the Slinfold Parish Council Clerk and the Information Commissioners Office casework@ico.org.uk Tel: 0303 123 1113.

Summary

In accordance with the law, Slinfold Parish Council only collects a limited amount of information about you that is necessary for correspondence, information and service provision. Slinfold Parish Council does not use profiling, nor does it sell your data to third parties, and does not use your data for purposes other than those specified. Slinfold Parish Council makes sure your data is stored securely, and deletes all information deemed to be no longer necessary. Slinfold Parish Council constantly reviews its Privacy Policies to keep them up to date in protecting your data. You can request a copy of our policies at any time.

TRAFFIC MATTERS



Road Closures in the parish on Sunday 23rd September as 15,000 cyclists are welcomed to West Sussex.

On Sunday 23 September, the inaugural Vélo South, a major 100-mile closed road sportive, will welcome 15,000 cyclists to West Sussex, showcasing the beauty of its countryside. The event is a great platform for local and national charities to raise money for good causes, anticipated to be one of the most successful charitable sporting events of 2018.

This cycling event will involve closing about 100 miles of road around Sussex and Slinfold will be affected as follows:

The Velo team are keeping the Parish Council informed and are also currently working alongside West Sussex County Council and Chichester and Horsham District Councils developing their TTRO application. Once complete, the final details of the road closures will be advertised by West Sussex County Council in conjunction with wider communications.

Slinfold Community Speedwatch

A Community Speedwatch group has been operating in Slinfold since early December 2017. There are nearly 20 volunteers, although only around 7 are now actually active. You may well have seen some of the volunteers standing by the road in high-visibility jackets. Between them, they have so far carried out over 120 hours of speed-watching, recording any vehicles that exceed 35 in a 30 limit or 46 in a 40 limit. Owners of such vehicles will receive a letter from the Police reminding them of the importance of driving at safe and legal speeds. And there is some evidence that average speeds have dropped a bit since the Speedwatch group started – so it is a worthwhile exercise.

The location where the group sees the highest number of speeders is on Park Street, just 100 yards or so in from the A29 junction. This is a 30 mph limit, but generally about 10% to 12% of vehicles exceed 36 mph here during the evening rush hour. We hope that residents will remember to keep their speeds down around the Parish (and elsewhere too, of course). The group is keen to welcome new volunteers, which would enable it to extend the monitoring sessions, and would help spread the burden a bit. If you are exercised about speeding around the Parish, please contact the Parish Clerk who will put you in touch with the Speedwatch group coordinator.

Traffic calming survey

Thank you so much to everyone who took the time to complete the paper or online survey on traffic calming! We received a good number of responses from all over the Parish and the results show that 80% of respondents are in favour of applying for a new highway scheme. Over 70% of respondents even said they would be willing to have Council Tax increased to pay for such a scheme, but we are hoping this option does not have to be considered.

Thank you also for all the comments made – it is clear that the majority of

respondents believe that traffic calming (which does not just refer to speeding) is required throughout the Parish and that not many people are in favour of speed bumps! All this feedback will be passed on to WSCC as part of an application.

We are pleased to advise that an application to WSCC is now in the system and we await their further advice on whether they would support a scheme for Slinfold and if they would what it is the next stage in the process. Please be aware that this is likely to be a long process.

In the meantime, please continue to support the Community Speedwatch initiative.

Good news on this application. WSCC's legal department is consulting on the Traffic Regulation Order. This has the full support of your Parish Council and your District and County Councillors.

Parking on pavements is not acceptable

Please can we remind residents that it is anti-social to park wholly or partially on a pavement. Parking on the pavement can obstruct and seriously inconvenience pedestrians, people in wheelchairs or with visual impairments and people with prams or pushchairs. In many areas of the village, parking on the pavements forces pedestrians and other pavement users to move into the road and this is not acceptable as our village roads are narrow and busy.

We will do all that we can to raise this with the vehicle owner concerned and inform the appropriate authorities.



Clerk's corner

I can't believe we are nearly halfway through another year! I started as Clerk July 2007 so will have been with the PC for 11 years, phew! I love my job and firmly believe that your Council makes a real difference. If you sometimes wonder what it is that we do, just take a look at the full Chairman's Report or the minutes on our website!

Thankfully, there are not too many downsides to my job but in April this year I was upset and dismayed at the criticism of the Parish Council on Social Media and questioned whether

Facebook is a good or bad thing for the Parish Council to be involved with, for me the jury is still out. Why, because I feel it can be more destructive than constructive. Often exchanges occur between just a handful of people and we must consider how representative these few are of the whole parish and put comments into perspective, however complimentary or hurtful.

A definition – Social media are web-based communication tools that enable people to interact with each other by both sharing and consuming information.

So what's this definition got to do with the price of fish you may ask? Well that is because the PC has to consider very carefully how they engage on social media. A Parish Council is made up of a group of councillors, in our case 11, and they are a corporate body. Social media is about people interacting with each other but the PC is not a person so it cannot interact in the same way. The PC can't debate on Social Media; there is a proper forum to do that i.e. council meetings and we have over 20 of these annually.

So where am I going with this? Well for now the message is...

- We shall post articles of interest from time to time;

- We won't debate on Facebook but we may share decisions already made by the Council;
- We ask that FaceBookers remain polite when interacting with other people;
- We want to hear your views and you can share these at meetings or by contacting the Clerk by email or telephone;
- Our website and newsletters contain lots of information about your Parish Council, meeting dates and the work that they do, please take a few moments to have a read.
- Please refer to our social media policy on the Parish Council website for further information

My challenges over the next few months are to help the Football Club settle back into their home at Cherry Tree where I shall also have a Parish Council Office, so we can revert back to good old fashioned face to face media!

Renewable energy in Slinfold

The Parish Council has been awarded a £18,000 grant from the Rural Community Energy Fund (RCEF) to explore the benefit of onsite renewables for the village hall and local shop, the tennis and football clubs.

With the Parish Council acting as the representative of these different community groups, many more people in the village can take advantage of onsite renewables – particularly solar PV and solar thermal, and ground source heat pumps. We look forward to seeing what can be achieved in our community!

Carbon Smart have been appointed to deliver the feasibility study, and are starting work with the key sites in the coming weeks.

"There's great potential in Slinfold to save money, generate new income streams for the community, and reduce environmental impacts. We're working closely with the Council and the different sites to make sure our recommendations benefit Slinfold." Helen Troup, Senior Consultant, Carbon Smart.

RCEF is a £15 million programme, delivered by WRAP and jointly funded by the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) and the Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy (DBEIS). It supports rural communities in England to develop renewable energy projects which provide economic and social benefits to the community.

- An initial grant of up to £20,000 will pay for investigations into the renewable energy project's feasibility.
- A further £130,000 will then be available in the form of an unsecured

Overhanging Vegetation – take a quick look now

As the bird-nesting season comes to an end, please take a look to see if your hedges or trees overhang a footpath or road. Think about footpath and road users and ensure that your hedges and trees are regularly trimmed back. Footpaths and roads can be dangerously narrowed by overhanging vegetation. At the moment some hedges in Hayes Lane are dangerously narrowing the footpaths.

Please spare a thought for the elderly, blind, wheelchair and pushchair users on footpaths and ensure that your hedgerow is regularly trimmed, so that they are not forced to walk into the road. You run the risk of formal notice from the County Council if you fail to keep overhanging vegetation under control, and could even face legal action from an injured member of the public.
